Alumni of the Year Award

The 2009 Alumni Award will be presented to Sister Christine Cosgrove, O.P., '74 at Reunion festivities Saturday, June 6. This award recognizes her many years as a religious dedicated to service in the Church through her work as a teacher and administrator, and as a passionate advocate for involvement in the global community.

For more than 20 years Sister Christine taught and was an administrator at Dominican Academy in New York City; she currently is director of advancement and assistant principal at St. Vincent Ferrer High School, also in New York City. Both Dominican Academy and St. Vincent Ferrer are private Catholic high schools for young women. Over the years, Sister Christine has inspired her students to not only succeed academically, but to be open to a wider world beyond the classroom. She has led tours abroad, completing trips with more than 2,000 students and families to many European countries, as well as to Japan, South America, Australia and New Zealand.

In 2007, she created a "Twinning" program for St. Vincent Ferrer High School with Ste. Jeanne D'Arc High School, a day/boarding school for girls in Abomey, Benin, West Africa. Through her fund-raising efforts, Abomey soon will have a water tower on school

grounds and eventually a chicken coop. She also is working with a UNESCO group to get biomass equipment to provide a source of energy for the Abomey school.

An English literature major at Albertus, she went on to receive master's degrees from Saint Joseph Seminary and Fordham University, and a Ph.D. from Fordham.

The nomination of Sister Christine describes her as a "truly extraordinary person who has followed God's call in her life faithfully and has made a huge impact on those with whom she has worked over the years. Her students respect and love her, the parents value her vast experience and knowledge, and her peers and sisters in her community see her as a dedicated religious woman, an outstanding professional and one who has had a profound impact on many lives.... She has carried the mission of Albertus Magnus College into her life and experience."

Rosette DuBois Dies After Lengthy Illness

Rosette DuBois, executive director of the New Dimensions program, died February 1 after a year of battling breast cancer. She had joined the New Dimensions staff in 1997 as an adjunct faculty member, and also served as director of the Fairfield County regional campus. A graduate of Westfield State College with an undergraduate degree in business administration, she received a master's degree in organizational management from Central Connecticut State University.

Rios Named Dean for New Dimensions

Dr. Irene Rios has joined Albertus Magnus College as dean for the School of New Dimensions, a vital component of the College's educational portfolio. She has 25 years of higher education experience, including non-traditional education.

Most recently she was executive director of academic services at Springfield College in Springfield, Massachusetts. Previously she served as registrar at St. Joseph College in West Hartford and director of academic advising at Rochester Institute of Technology.

Dr. Rios received a doctorate in education from the University of Hartford, and is the 2008 winner of the National Academic Advising Student Research Award for the work done in her dissertation. She holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Rochester Institute of Technology, and has taught graduate and undergraduate courses.

AMC Senior Named a Connecticut Student Poet

Katie Rowe, a senior sociology major from North Haven, Connecticut, is one of five students from Connecticut colleges and universities selected as a Student Poet for the 2008–2009 academic year by the Connecticut Poetry Circuit. This year's other honorees are from the University of Hartford, Yale University, Wesleyan University and Tunxis Community College.

The student poets traveled the state during the spring, reading their poems at eight campuses. They have been invited to participate in the Sunken Garden Poetry Festival at the Hill-Stead Museum in Farmington June 24.

"Winning the Connecticut Poetry Circuit is beyond an honor," Rowe says. "Writing can be an individual art, but it is also rewarding to share one's writing with others...others who love to write." She finds the Poetry Circuit a "little writer's community where we understand one another's relationships with writing. I've had the opportunity to get to know four other writers and their poetry. Each night when I hear them read their poems, I find something new and beautiful in them."

This co-editor of "Breakwater," the campus literary magazine, began writing stories in the second grade. "While I did write poetry when I was younger, I was much more interested in writing stories; I loved creating characters and placing them in situations," she remembers. "I don't feel I really developed my own poetic voice until college when I took writing

courses with Dr. Cole, and I've been mostly writing poetry since. My poetry now reflects what I loved about writing stories when I was younger: I write about the characters and situations I know."

Not sure what she will be doing after graduation, Katie Rowe hopes to go to graduate school at some point. "Regardless of whatever jobs I take or whatever life I build for myself, I hope I continue finding the inspiration to write."

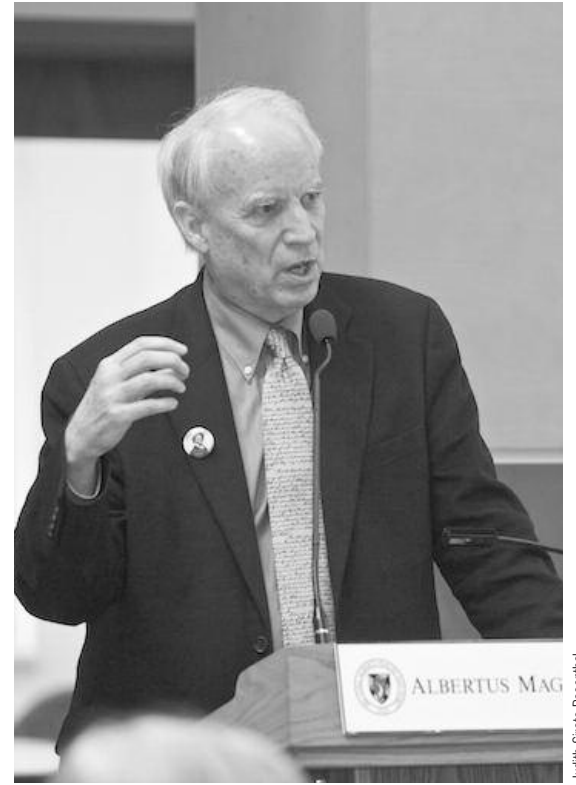
Lincoln Bicentennial Celebration: An Update

The Lincoln penny drive, coordinated by the Campus Ministry Team as part of the College's year-long celebration of the bicentennial of Abraham Lincoln's birth, has been a success; jars of pennies are still coming in. Monies collected will benefit Pennies for Peace. A project of the non-profit Central Asia Institute, Pennies for Peace supports schooling for children in the border region between Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Michael Burlingame, Sadowski professor emeritus of history at Connecticut College and co-chair of the Connecticut Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission, spoke April 3 on the impact that Lincoln's presidency had on how the Constitution is read and interpreted. He is the author of 12 biographies on Lincoln; his latest multi-volume work, "Abraham Lincoln: A Life," appeared in December 2008 to outstanding reviews. Historian Doris Kearns Goodwin has said that this "profound and masterful portrait will be read and studied for years to come." Publisher's Weekly described the book as one of "PW's Best Books of the Year." The final event in the Albertus celebration of the Lincoln Bicentennial is September 16 at 12:10 p.m. in the Tagliatela Academic Center; Michael Geary, J.D., coordinator of the Albertus criminal justice program, will speak on "Lincoln and the Civil War: The Constitution in Peril." On February 13, Dr. Robert Bourgeois, assistant professor of humanities, spoke on "Abraham Lincoln: Tragedy, Fate, and Myth" to a large crowd of students, faculty, staff and members of the New Haven community. The talk was part of the Tagliatela School of Business and Leadership Faculty Forum programming.

Also in February, students in the Drawing I class exhibited works inspired by Lincoln's speeches and writings. Bryan Barrera, Marissa Dooner, Erica Hatrick, Sydney McAvoy, Daniel Rivera, Kevin Tierney and Bonnie Tormay had their posters on display at Rosary Hall.

Why They Teach

An occasional series in which members of the College's distinguished faculty reflect on why they teach

Before my college teaching career, I worked for almost 20 years in corporate management and information systems. During that time my favorite position was the four years that I spent as a senior technical instructor at a Fortune 200 company. It was then that personal computers were beginning to be seriously used in the business world and my position involved training both employees and customers on a wide array of systems and application software. I found that I enjoyed teaching immensely. So much so, in fact, that I started my own computer software training business and taught part-time at several colleges. That, in turn, led in 1994 to the position of Director of the MIS Program (now the Computer Information Systems Program) at Albertus Magnus.

I loved Albertus Magnus from the start. It was exactly what I had

imagined the ideal traditional college to be: a small but elegant campus, a faculty that cared about the students as individuals, and students who were eager to learn of all areas of knowledge. Computer majors not only took important courses in their discipline, but they acquired the diverse liberal arts background that is so important for a well-rounded individual.

In addition to teaching a subject that is so important to today's worker, I find it rewarding to counsel students on getting their first job or, in the case of older learners, on using their knowledge and abilities to the fullest. I am especially pleased each time I hear of graduates becoming web designers or project managers, starting their own companies, or even becoming teachers themselves.

- In December, Business Policy Seminar classes taught by Dr. Clara Munson delivered gifts—toys, bath supplies, outer wear, bedding and other items suggested by cards on a “giving tree”—to 26 children at Life Haven, a temporary shelter for homeless pregnant women and women with young children in New Haven. In addition, the classes made a donation of \$750.00, proceeds from a fund raiser, to the shelter.
- Lynn Fusco, a member of the College’s Board of Trustees and president of the Fusco Corporation—one of the leading construction and property management companies in New England—has been elected chair of the Board of Trustees of Connecticut Public Broadcasting, Inc., parent company of Connecticut Public Television and Connecticut Public Radio.
- On April 22, students in the freshman English honors program visited Whitney Center, a senior community in Hamden, to share original and favorite poems with the residents. The event was part of the College’s participation in the Favorite Poem Project—created by former U.S. Poet Laureate Robert Pinsky to encourage the reading of poetry—a major component of this year’s International Festival of Arts and Ideas in New Haven. Pinsky will be in town June 13 to kick off the Festival. During April and May the Library at Rosary Hall and the College’s bookstore will celebrate poetry with readings and postings of the favorite poems of members of the Albertus community.
- Paul Robichaud, assistant professor of English and director of the Master of Arts in Liberal Studies program, has had two poems accepted for publication by *Agenda*, a prominent poetry journal in the United Kingdom. “The Spear,” a translation from the medieval Welsh poet Dafydd ap Gwylim will appear in the upcoming Welsh issue; “The Possum” will be published in the 50th anniversary issue later this year. Founded in 1959 by Ezra Pound and William Cookson, the journal recently published work by Seamus Heaney, Billy Collins and Paul Muldoon.
- Dr. Douglas W. Dingman, microbiologist and molecular biologist at The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station in New Haven, recently spoke to science students, exploring the health and mysterious disappearance of millions of honeybees, a major environmental issue. Dr. Isaac Hon, associate professor in the department of biology and chemistry at Albertus, hosted the session.
- Student members of the Campus Ministry Team planned and staged a post-Valentine’s “senior prom” for participants in the Clelian Adult Day Center in Hamden. Everyone enjoyed singing, dancing and inter-generational conversation.
- Art history students in the Museum and Curatorial Studies course hosted the February 26 opening reception for “Real Places, Ideal Spaces,” an exhibition of works by Rachel Hellerich and Rashmi Talpade. The students also curated the show, which ran through March 20. 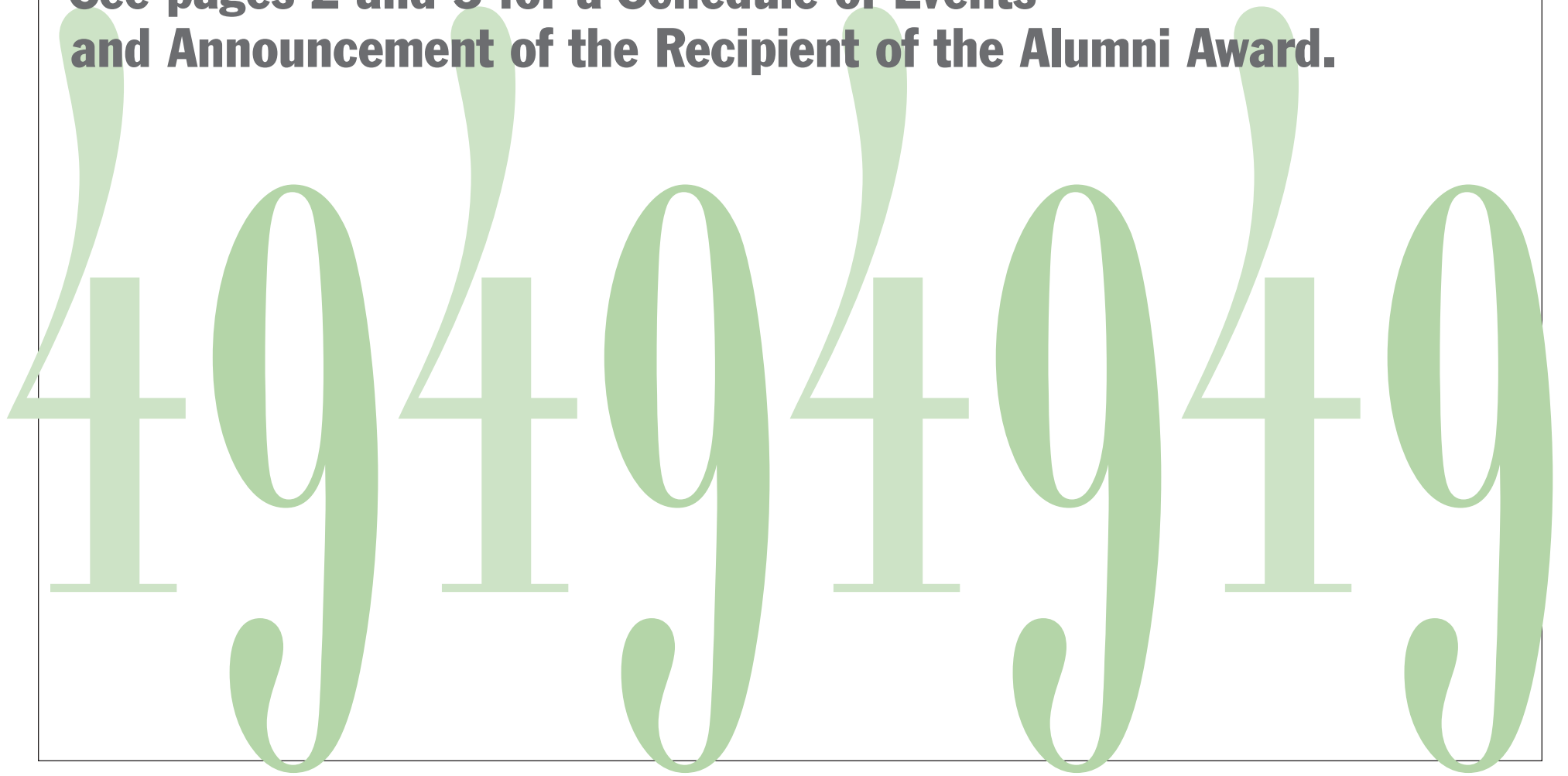
Publisher's Weekly said, "With crisp prose and surprisingly poignant moments, Ferraiolo's debut entertains on many levels."
